

Laudato Si





St Patrick's College is a Catholic Secondary School for Girls in the Good Samaritan Tradition, which operates under the trusteeship of Good Samaritan Education. The College's rich history dates back to when Bishop Polding, a Benedictine monk, blessed the original foundation stone of the first St Patrick's site on 17 March in 1840. This makes the College the oldest Catholic independent school in Australia built and funded by local enterprise without government assistance.

As a Christ-centred community, formed in the Good Samaritan tradition, St Patrick's College empowers young women through holistic education to be independent and resilient lifelong learners who are actively engaged in working for a just society. Through their participation in the community of St Patrick's College, students, parents and staff encounter the interconnectedness of life and, in a spirit of Benedictine stewardship, learn to reverence the whole of creation. As such we view the Pope's call to take action for Our Common Home seriously and as part of our mission.

Our Identity Statement, "Arrange all things so the strong have something to strive for and the weak have nothing to run from" (Rule of Benedict 64:19), clearly relates to current climate crisis and our need to be active in our response to this. We believe that we need to form minds that understand that the strong need to strive to make change to the way we live to save the planet. The poor should have nothing to run from in terms of the impact our unsustainable lifestyles cause and they should be protected as should the earth. We are committed to listen to the voice of creation.

As a mission team we have been working towards this reflection for some months now and Stewardship has been a focus with both staff and students at the College. We began working with staff during our Proffesional Development Week held at the start of Term 3. Beth Riolo delivered a presentation about Laudato Si' and the need for ecological conversion. She shared an interesting perspective on the Parable of the Good Samaritan and the Commandment of Love. The command to love our neighbour was analysed with the view that our neighbour is the earth itself. This set the stage for our Staff Spirituality Day at the end of the week where we delved deeper into Laudato Si' and the Climate Crisis. We also shared the results of our assessmenty via the Laudato Si' Action Platform. These are shown below:



RESULTS OF OUR ASSESSMENT - 4 KEY AREAS



We have gathered the views and input of students and staff as part of our reflection process. We decided to create a new group within the College titled the Laudato Si' Social Justice Group and have a strong membership particularly with Yr 11 Students. This is a group we hope to grow over the coming years. Students were asked to share ideas and consider the suggested actions on the Laudato Si' Action Platform in relation to the key goals. The following table was created:

We will use all of this data plus a reflection on our work this year during the Season of Creation to create our Action Plan for the remaining 6 years. This year we have for the first time Celebrated the Season of Creation. While there were some actions that were planned that were unsuccessful, we have made a start and believe that from small things, big things grow. We chose to raise awareness of the issue of Fast Fashion which has a devastating impact on the earth and the poor and is driven by overconsumerism. This issue was suggested by the students and is a relatable one. We held a Winter Sleepout and a Fast Fashion Market that raised money for St Vincent de Paul. We also made the cry of the earth and poor our focus in ritual and prayer life during the Season of Creation. There were prayers shared and encouraged with pastoral classes as was the theme of the Burning Bush. Each pastoral class was encouraged to make a burning bush.

We have also decided that we want our commitment to listen to the cry of the earth to be visible within the College. The following posters have been created to draw attention to the 7 goals that we are working towards.
